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#### House Traditions: Scavenger Hunt

Live-In Weekend is a scaled down, more sedate version of the "Hell Week" held by other fraternities and sororities. It consists of a large number of activities designed to get the house members doing things together and spending time together.

One of the activities that has been a tradition for a long, long time is the Scavenger Hunt. Held on Saturday afternoon, each pledge, along with their big brother or sister, is asked to collect as many of the items on the scavenger hunt list as possible in the time allotted.

Members without Littles become the judges and rate the items collected by the various teams. Scores are based upon how closely an item matches what was asked for on the list and how creative the teams' items were.

For example, one item often asked for is a "ring of fire". A map of the volcanic region of the Pacific Ocean (known as "The Ring of Fire") would do, as would a paper plate with the middle cut out, then set aflame. Of course, the former is, perhaps, more creative than the latter.

Several of the items on the scavenger hunt are clues that should lead the teams to various house members. Each of these house members has a section of the Creed and the pledges need to get all the different parts of the Creed. At the judging they recite the Creed to the judges, from memory earns more points, but if they have to read from the scraps, that's okay.

There's usually not any specific prize for the winners, just the knowledge that they kicked the other teams' collective butts.

#### House Traditions: Tau Trivia

Another tradition that takes place during Live-In Weekend is **Tau Trivia**. This is held Saturday night, after Pledge Dinner has been digested (or otherwise disposed of... we're looking at you, pledges of spring 99... with your burnt pizza and raw brownies!). Tau Trivia is one of the most popular events of Live\_in Weekend, drawing many alumni to attend.

During Tau Trivia, a pledge sits in a chair atop the round coffee table, with their Big on the table with them (and any other members of their lineage who wish to participate). The Big and other family members all <u>must</u> have drinks; the pledge can have one if they want to but it is not required (this is to ensure that pledges are not being hazed).

The active members and alumni in attendance then call out trivia questions about people, places, activities, and anything else that relates to the the House, its members, or its history. If the pledge gets an answer wrong, their Big has to drink (the pledge can drink, too, if they wish to). If the pledge gets an answer correct, everyone in the room EXCEPT the pledge and their Big has to drink.

Many of the questions involve tales of people whom the pledges have never met, some of whom

they have not even heard of. Other questions relate to more general house historic questions. As one might guess, some of these questions can border on the impossible for a pledge to answer.

It's the responsibility of the Big to make sure their Little has learned at least some small amount of Tau Trivia, although if a Big wants to get trashed, they often don't teach their Little too much! And, if the pledge is doing too well, the actives and alumni will begin asking more obscure questions to compensate.

Correct answers are only announced (if not answered correctly previously by a pledge) at the end of the evening. This permits questions to be recycled if an earlier pledge couldn't answer it.

To assist the actives in keeping older, more obscure Tau Trivia from being forgotten, the Alumni Association gave a gift, Tau-Opoly, to the House last year. One of the features of Tau-Opoly (based upon the Parker Brother's game, Monopoly) is the deck of Tau Trivia cards. Replacing the Community Chest, Tau Trivia cards ask questions similar to those asked during Tau Trivia during Live-In. Correct responses usually get the player nothing at all.
