
There is a small committee of people working on memory books and "save-the-date" letters were mailed out in January to nearly 450 alumni that we have contact information for.

ENCOURAGEMENT TO DONATE TO THE COLLEGE

Before you accuse me of “working for ‘The Man’” I ask you to hear me out.

Because of the economic situation, the college is a bit short on cash. There are limits on what monies they can access from their endowment and investments and annual fund giving is (understandably) running behind last year.

Ripon is actually doing better than many other colleges in their fund raising and in their ability to weather the storm, but things are tight and will get tighter.

Understandably, alumni donations are down this year... not a lot, but they are down. Donations from those alumni who **can** afford to add a little to their already yearly donations or first time donations from other alumni would help the college a lot.

Why should you donate? Well, I can't give you lots of reasons: the school was expensive and many of us are still paying for the degree we did (or didn't) get. Many alumni may not have had the best of experiences in dealing with the college, either as students or as alumni, and that can factor into the decision making process, too.

I have a little bit of a different reason for encouraging donations:

Tau. Think about this: if Theta Chi (or another national) at Ripon goes away, Ripon Theta Chis will be saddened, but Theta Chi is national and will go on. However, there is only one school in all the country with a chapter of Theta Sigma Tau: Ripon. We're not national and will probably never be because of the logistical and legal issues that this would entail (yes, there has been investigation of this).

This means that the success of the college and the continued existence of the House are intimately tied together. An effort to keep the college afloat is an effort to keep Tau on track for it's bicentennial anniversary in 2110.

During the Spring 2009 Alumni Board meetings I spoke to several people about the fact that Greek alumni are probably more generous and more involved with the college than non-Greek alumni. I am now working with an administration official to research this. My reason for making this effort is to prove to the college that they have a vested interest in their Greeks. Just as we rely upon them, they rely heavily upon us.

So, I would ask those of you who can afford to do so to donate something to Ripon this year, even just \$5 or \$10. I would also

encourage you to indicate to the college that you are doing this in large part because of your ties to Tau and the fact that you found Greek life at Ripon to be rewarding and to have a positive impact upon your post-Ripon life. This will reinforce to the college the importance of the Greek organizations and their alumni to its future success.

So you can give me all the crap you want, but at the end of the day, those of you who really know me know that my support for Ripon is wholly due to my membership in and relationship with Tau. My efforts here and elsewhere are primarily motivated by doing what's best for the continuation and strengthening of the House. I think we all found something of value in the east end of Mapes and doing something to support it, including giving money to the college, just makes sense.

House alumni Pete Lenz (1989), John Ryberg (1967) and senior Dustin Zuelke (2009) are currently members of the Ripon College Alumni Board. Past members associated with Tau include Bruce Davis (1982), Dave Shogren (1984), and probably several alumni whose status as board members is not on our books.
